The fruit trees at our home are bearing their fruit. I love

walking outside during these cool June mornings to see dew-dipped blueberries and golf ball size peaches growing on the bushes and trees. Obviously, the type of tree determines the type of fruit that I see. I have never expected to see bananas growing on our peach tree or strawberries bursting from the blueberry bushes.



Matthew 3 is describing a scene on the banks of the Jordan River: one day John the Baptist is preaching, he looks around on the congregation and sees in it Pharisees and Scribes, religious leaders who were enslaving the people by their laws and over-lording aggression, and he could not contain his emotions: "You bunch of snakes!" They were definitely not producing fruit that would indicate changed or cleansed lives. How could he baptize a man or woman which represented their desire to have their sins washed away, when they were still living in those sins? This is not unlike a person in our day that comes to the church, makes a profession of faith in Jesus Christ, is baptized, and then goes away living as wickedly as he/she came.

John and Jesus were both preaching repentance, and repentance is a complete turning away from old sins or old ways. If your life was bearing the fruit of anger before, then it should be bearing the fruit of patience now. If your life bore the fruit of sensuality before, then following true repentance it should bear fruits of chastity and virtue now. We are all fruit inspectors; the biggest problem is that, unlike the old adage, we see the forest around us and miss the tree of our own life. Are the fruits that are growing and showing in your life fitting of a life of repentance? Do they appear as righteousness since we as redeemed children of God have taken on the righteousness of Christ? The fruit is one of the best indicators of the type and health of the tree, so what is the fruit of your life telling you? What is it telling others?

Pray that the church will be loving, bold, and courageous to step out and minister fearlessly for the sake of Christ! Yes, may we all say like the Psalmist in Psalms 16:6, "The lines have fallen to me in pleasant places; Yes, I have a good inheritance." May we thank God everyday for placing us in this little mountain community. But may we also seek to take the message of Christ, lovingly, boldly, and confidently to a world that desperately needs to hear it.
